## "Transcivilization" "Manifest for a World Governance Outlook"

## **Synopsis**

Observing humanity's evolution since Lucy's times and unearthing the complex cross-centuries web of innovations, "Transcivilization" highlights sporadic survival-linked behavior mutations. Improving time life expectancy, six main "Flashpoints" phenomena (mobility, culture, agriculture, norms setting, reasoning & quantitative growth) set off successive new endurance options leading to the appearance and eventual fading of varying cultures and governance values. Often branded under the term "civilization", these evolved asymmetrically mainly because of natural features related to water accessibility. In their uneven drive to colonize the earth's resources during the pre-globalization age, humans adopted two main often clashing strategies: a) survive through nomadic liberties; championed earlier by the likes of Alexander or Genghis Khan and today by the Anglo Saxon search for "new frontiers opportunities" and b) survive through improved sedentary efficiency as followed by the world's population majority.

Setting totally new perspective through exponential knowledge and demographic growth that forces the appearance of overwhelming individual and multilateral needs; the 20 century's "Quantitative Flashpoint" global mutation inevitably commands a fundamental redefinition of prevailing outdated governance norms. Recent decades' dramatic events signal that policy decisions not complying with new realities are the biggest threats to humanity. Wars, indeed terrorist acts, human rights violation or economic disasters are just consequence of ill-defined governance principles. The urgently needed normative adjustments are however resisted by conformity to inherited patriarchal traditions, spiritual as well as socio-political dogmas. To overcome these blocking impasses, the "Transcivilization" manifest suggests the work-out by civil societies of a new more federative division of policy decision-making norms that involves all categories of our earth stakeholders. This major re-organization of human decision-making principles signifies that today's main international institutions, including the UN as well as other traditional norm claiming guardians, are either disbanded or transformed into new generation tools compatible with 21 century standards.
